I am writing to you in response to your call for Public consultation on "Summary of Clinical Trial Results for Laypersons". I am responding as an individual.

Given that research participants and the general public are expected to be the primary audience of the lay summaries, there are two major points I would like to address:

First, in light of the health literacy levels observed in the general population, a text, even though written in lay language, may not be the most appealing format. It may therefore fail to generate interest, response, and ultimately the sharing of information within a person's social network. This in turn will hamper the knowledge dissemination process. In addition to the written lay summary, I would therefore suggest to also produce lay summaries in video (including subtitles) or infographic format (elements of infotainment). My second point relates to the access provided to the lay summaries via the EU database. Communicating results of clinical trials is essential not only to disseminate knowledge but also to generate interest and (financial) support for follow-up studies. The availability and accessibility of lay summaries of course play a critical role in this process. However, it is equally important to ensure that summaries are found and consumed by the intended target audiences. For this reason, I would suggest to also consider the use of social media channels like YouTube, Twitter, and Facebook when planning the dissemination strategy.
