European Health Union

- Regulation on serious cross-border threats to health
 - Political agreement between the co-legislators reached on 23 June 2022
 - Vote in the European Parliament on 4 October 2022
 - Approval by the Council on 24 October 2022

ENTRY INTO FORCE expected in January 2023

- New mandate of key EU agencies
 - European Centre for Diseases Prevention and Control (ECDC) adoption 24 Oct 2022
 - European Medicines Agency (EMA) 1 March 2022
- Emergency Framework Regulation adoption 24 Oct 2022

SCBTH Regulation – Chapter I General provisions (Articles 1-4)

General provisions

• Subject matter and the scope of the Regulation – new elements: a network of EU reference laboratories, a network for substances of human origin, an advisory committee for recognition of public health emergency at Union level

Biological

Origins of threats







- The Health Security Committee:
 - Two-tier structure (senior level and technical level)
 - Adoption of opinions, guidance and communications and recommendations on surveillance and adoption of working programme

SCBTH Regulation – Chapter II Prevention, preparedness and response planning (Articles 5-12)

Prevention, preparedness and response planning

- EU health crisis and pandemic preparedness plan
- Comprehensive and transparent framework for reporting on and assessments of preparedness and response planning
- Regular public health and cross-sector stress tests and exercises carried out with Member States
- Targeted training and knowledge exchange activities for healthcare and public health staff
- A reinforced joint procurement



SCBTH Regulation – Chapter III Epidemiological surveillance, EU reference laboratories and ad hoc monitoring (Articles 13-17)


Epidemiological surveillance, new networks

- A new high performing epidemiological surveillance system at the EU level
- Strengthened access of ECDC to health data for research and epidemiological aspects, in the context of the future systems (eg. European Health Data Space)
- Reporting requirements on health system capacity; surveillance linked to other available information sources and data
- Creation of new networks:
 - EU reference laboratories network
 - EU network on use of substances of human origin & communicable diseases

SCBTH Regulation – Chapter IV

Early warning and response and risk assessment (Articles 18-22)

- Notifications including on urgent need or shortage of medical countermeasures
- A new risk
 assessment
 framework for all
 hazards,
 - Agencies involved, including: ECDC, EFSA, ECHA, EEA EMCDDA, Europol, EMA





SCBTH Regulation – Chapter V Public health emergency at Union level (Articles 23-25)

Coordinated response at EU level

- Recommendations on response measures
- Adoption of opinions and guidance, including on specific response measures by the Health Security Committee, Commission Recommendation on response measures
- EU recognition of an emergency situation and advice on response measures, supported by an independent (multidisciplinary) Advisory Committee
- EU emergency situation triggering increased coordination and allow for the development, stockpiling and procurement of crisis relevant products



SCBTH Regulation – Chapter VI Final provisions (Articles 26-35)

- December 2024 first evaluation of the implementation of the Regulation including:
 - Assessment of the operation of EWRS
 - Coordination of the response within the HSC
 - Implementation of this Regulation by Health Emergency Preparedness and Response Authority (HERA)

SCBTH Regulation – implementation

- Focus for 2023:
 - Union prevention, preparedness and response plan
 - Reporting on preparedness
 - Setting-up standard operating procedures between the EU Agencies to work on risk assessment
 - New developments for EWRS
 - Supporting actions for setting-up the EU Reference Laboratory network
