



European Union actions to ensure better health for all in a changing world

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Good health is the foundation for fair and resilient societies. The EU is adapting to growing health threats and taking steps to improve prevention, preparedness and response, notably through the **European Health Union** and the new **EU Global Health Strategy**. Team Europe initiatives under the **Global Gateway** are helping to improve health security and increase health systems resilience around the world. The EU has shown strong commitment to the pandemic agreement negotiations and revision of the International Health Regulations. The EU also works closely with the **G7, G20** and other global, regional and bilateral partners to ensure better health for all.



Looking back: Keeping people safe during the pandemic

The EU's role in fighting the COVID-19 pandemic reaffirmed EU's commitment to multilateralism, solidarity, and making major contributions to global objectives through the Team Europe approach.

- € 53.7 billion to help partner countries cope with the COVID-19 health emergency.
- Over 190 million medical and personal protective equipment items such as masks and ventilators distributed through the Civil Protection Mechanism to third countries.
- More than half a billion vaccine doses donated and over €5 billion provided in grants and loans, making Team Europe one of the biggest donors of COVAX.
- 3.1 billion COVID-19 vaccine doses exported from the EU.

- More than €1.7 billion in R&D investments in COVID-19 vaccines from the EU and Member States, which accounted for 28% of global investments.
- More than 2.2 billion EU Digital COVID Certificates issued in Europe by summer 2023.
- 78 countries and territories connected to the EU Gateway to verify Certificates.
- €43 billion of Recovery and Resilience Facility (RRF) resources earmarked to strengthen resilience of Member States' health systems.



Ensuring greater EU health security under the European Health Union

The EU has built a European Health Union in which all EU countries prepare and respond together to health crises, ensure access to medical supplies, and work together to address health challenges.

- A stronger EU health security framework, enshrined in law, with better preparedness planning, surveillance, and coordination between Member States.
- A reinforced EU Health Security Committee as a key mechanism for coordinated response.
- A more robust European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control and European Medicines Agency, so that they are fit for today's world.
- Creation of an EU cross-agency One Health Taskforce (ECDC, ECHA, EEA, EFSA, EMA).
- A new Health Emergency Preparedness and Response Authority (HERA) that strengthens Europe's ability to prevent, detect, and respond to cross-border health emergencies through medical countermeasures.
- A EU4Health programme, with a €2.6 billion budget for contributions that enhance EU health security.



Mobilising resources for global health and combating cross-border health threats

Good health, and good global health, are investments in our health security and in the future of our societies and our planet. The EU is backing its goals and its partners with concrete support.

- Team Europe contributions to the Pandemic Fund worth €735 million i.e. close to half of all pledges – making the EU and its Member States the largest donor.
- A €353 million Team Europe Initiative in 2022-2027 on Sustainable Health Security using a One Health approach to strengthen prevention, preparedness and response to infectious threats and anti-microbial resistance in African countries.
- €715 million Team Europe contributions to the Global Fund to fight against AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria in 2023-2025, constituting around 30% of the budget.
- Contribution to Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, of €300 Million for 2021-2025.



Improving information sharing, threat assessment, and research and development

The EU strengthens collaboration with global partners to gather intelligence, detect health threats, build surveillance capabilities, as well as to share capacity, data and samples. Critical areas of research include HIV, malaria, tropical diseases, vaccines, antimicrobial resistance and digital health.

- Collaboration with major non-EU centres for disease control (CDCs) and network of major CDCs established by ECDC for timely exchange of information and expertise.
- Support to capacity building for African CDC (ACDC) and African Medicines Agency.
- Open science approaches backed up recently by €52 million infrastructure investments to support sharing life sciences data and biological samples.
- Partnership with 64 countries on EU chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear (CBRN) Risk Mitigation Centres of Excellence.
- €8.2 billion to support international collaborations on health research and innovation, including more than €140 million in 2024 to accelerate vaccine research, clinical trials, and the development of effective treatments in vulnerable countries.

- €1.6 billion to support the EU-Africa Global Health Clinical Trials Partnership programme in the fight against poverty-related, neglected and emerging infectious diseases in sub-Saharan Africa.
- Over 500 000 global users of Copernicus services, and access to analyses of climate change risks to health through the European Climate and Health Observatory.





Improving access to health products through resilient supply chains, manufacturing capacities and health innovations

The EU and its Member States improve global access and distribution of health products through resilient supply chains, local manufacturing and by providing 36% of all global humanitarian aid.

- €1.3 billion Team Europe initiative to boost manufacturing of vaccines, medicines and health technologies in Africa (MAV+).
- EU commitment to contribute to the new African Vaccine Manufacturing Accelerator (AVMA) cocreated by Gavi and the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention, to be launched in June 2024.
- Partnerships with the US, South Korea, Japan and the World Health Organization on production of medical countermeasures to support third countries.
- €1.6 billion partnership with the European Investment Bank and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to enhance health systems and health innovations.
- €170 million from the EU Civil Protection Mechanism and European Humanitarian Response Capacity to respond to the Africa Centres to disease outbreaks in 2017-2021.

- €1.9 billion for rescEU capacity to respond to emergencies in the EU and beyond, including 23 medical and CBRN stockpiles, the world's three largest field hospitals, 18 specialised care teams, as well as medical evacuation and CBRN decontamination capacity.
- Emergency Toolbox activated 214 times in 2022-2023 as first-line response to emergencies outside the EU, including funding for the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement in disease outbreaks.
- Over 140 000 tonnes of humanitarian aid to Ukraine, worth €60 million, and evacuation of over 3000 Ukrainian patients to hospitals in 22 European countries.
