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

- Roadmap with European Commission agreed in 2010
 - First three steps of implementation completed

European Commission and WHO Regional Office for Europe: A shared vision for joint action

This Joint Declaration of the European Commission and the World Health Organization Regional Office for Europe was developed jointly by the WHO/Europe Secretariat and the European Commission. Both organizations consulted internally, according to their individual procedures and requirements, and these consultations were concluded with a political agreement – the Joint Declaration, that outlines the framework for the future cooperation between the two partnering organizations with a view to more efficient and effective collaboration in the area of public health. The Declaration was launched at a ceremony at the sixtieth session of the WHO Regional Committee for Europe, Moscow, the Russian Federation, on 13 September 2010, by

nformation and evidence for health policy- and decision-making in Europe is vital. Intercountry comparisons add a unique dimension to a country's own efforts and have proven to be very effective in pinpointing areas for public health action, at both European and country levels. This requires joint work to provide a common basis of information and evidence to ensure both the efficiency of our work and also its effectiveness.



Users of health information expect answers to questions about health at European level to be consistent, regardless of the source. Different answers to the same question undermine the credibility of both the Commission and the WHO. Working in partnership on the common collection and provision of information also reduces the burden on countries and makes best use of limited resources. We will therefore strengthen our cooperation in order to work towards a single integrated information system for health in Europe. This can build on existing cooperation, including expanding the use of shared data collection, collaborative analysis of health issues and generation and dissemination of knowledge in support of health policy.



Agreed roadmap for Health Information System for Europe

- 1. Conduct mapping exercises for existing health information systems & databases in the agencies;
- 2. Conduct reviews of the quality and architecture of information systems \rightarrow criteria;
- 3. Conduct landscaping of current and potential partners and stakeholders and engage them \rightarrow in progress;
- 4. Define common needs and constraints,

5. Discuss a concrete way forward based on the above steps and devise an action plan.







Next steps for health info initiative

- Initiative could serve as major vehicle towards an *integrated health information system for Europe* → support from all parts of European region and operative now;
- Expand partners network from current 8 (4 in EU) to more; other Member States currently considering their partnership;
- Need to re-think the name of the initiative to give all partners recognition;
- Currently finalizing business plan & defining type of collaborative framework that gives all partners equal rights and standing;
- Ensure good integration of other EURO activities (e.g. HEN) into initiative.

After a decade of dramatic growth in spending on global health, economic problems and political turmoil are causing some of the world's biggest funders including the United States government and United Nations agencies – to put the brakes on development assistance for health. Now more than ever, we need objective evidence to show policymakers what works and what does not work to improve people's lives.

The Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME) was created at the University of Washington to fill that information gap. We do this by focusing on three critical questions: What are the world's major health problems? How well is society addressing these problems? How do we best dedicate resources to maximize health improvement?


We answer those questions by measuring population health status and disease burden, identifying the factors that determine health outcomes, and rigorously evaluating health policies and interventions.
