1. The post 2015 process

Support the development of indicators:

- E.g. Health systems and universal health coverage
- > E.g. Linking health and environmental sustainability
- E.g. NCDs
- Focus on equity

EAGHA members can provide support on developing rationale, methods, selection and data sources for key indicators

2. Adaptation and mitigation of climate change

- Health is inextricably linked to climate change
- Health benefits from 'low carbon' economy (housing, transport, food and agriculture, electricity generation)

EAGHA members can help design, promote, implement and monitor policies to reduce pollutant emissions.

3. Health systems support & universal health coverage

- Health systems a neglected area of investment & engagement
- Universal health coverage a central component
- Equity a critical issue
- EAGHA has expertise in health systems analysis and health systems strengthening

EAGHA members can support priority setting, analysis, and policy development.

4. Measuring aid effectiveness

- Need to improve measurement of aid effectiveness and attribution (development and humanitarian contexts)
- Strengthen development of strategies, tools and indicators to harmonise and improve measurement approaches

EAGHA members have expertise in measuring aid effectiveness and can provide support on the above.

5. The Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership

- Transfer sovereign power from judicial system to unaccountable arbitrators?
- Fails to adequately protect right to regulate?
- Compromises government ability for public health legislation (e.g. tobacco packaging, alcohol pricing etc)?
- Reduce government control over private health providers?
- Global perspective
